Speaker – Hardyal Singh Dhindsa, Police & Crime Commissioner for Derbyshire.

Hardyal explained that he had been the Deputy Commissioner during the appointment of Alan Charles. He was proud, humbled and pleased to be appointed himself in this year's election and had taken over the position on 5th May.

His presentation:

He hopes to build on the work of Alan Charles, Continue to hold public scrutiny meetings, has made a commitment to visit every town and village in Derbyshire and has put Neighbourhood Policing is at the heart of his plan.

The Role of the PCC is:

- To hold the Chief Constable to account
- To set the force budget and council tax precept
- Regularly talk to our communities
- Commission services of partners to deliver community safety services
- Set and update the Police and Crime Plan

The Police and Crime plans have been updated.

- The draft plan was launched on August 24 th
- It is a 5 year plan from 2016 to 2021
- The pledges & promises are clearly outlined
- The plan contains 7 Strategic objectives
- With partnership working at the heart

The Strategic Objectives are:

- Working to keep the most vulnerable in our communities safe from crime and harm and supporting those who unfortunately find themselves a victim of crime
- 2. Working to provide strong and effective partnership working
- 3. Working to tackle the impact of drugs and alcohol on communities

- 4. Supporting those with mental health issues, including those with learning difficulties, who come into contact with the Criminal Justice System, as victim or offender, to get the right support, from the right agencies at the right time.
- Working with young people, including those who have been either victims of crime or offenders, to understand their needs and prevent them becoming involved in criminal activities
- Working with the Constabulary to develop the policing family to be more representative of the diverse communities it serves
- Working with the Constabulary and partners to maximise the opportunities from developments in technology.

Hardyal wants to ensure communities are put first 'The police are the public and the public are the police' – he will do this by:

Working to improve residents' quality of life by tackling:

Crime and disorder & Anti-Social Behaviour (funds are in place to help victims of anti-social behaviour)

Working in partnership with other agencies to tackle issues such as Road safety & Parking

The way forward:

The join Derbyshire Constabulary and Derbyshire Fire & Rescue Service HQ is now up and running to save on costs. On Wednesday 14 th September The House of Lords will be debating whether to merge the two agencies - Hardyal may not agree with this debate but would like to see the agencies work more closely together and have a better complaints procedure.

Hardyal also wants to free up more officers by ensuring they have the most up to date technology:by November 2016-January 2017 all officers should be using mobile IPads so that they can look up information etc. whilst out on patrol.

Derbyshire Alert:

The messaging alert scheme was due to be finished but the decision has been made to keep the service running. A new system has been established and all participants on the old system need to re-register themselves at: https://www.derbyshirealert.co.uk

The scheme is also working much closer with Neighbourhood Watch.

Restorative Justice:

The Restorative Justice contract was awarded April 2015 (3 year contract) by former PCC Alan Charles - The charity 'Remedi' provide this service

Each referral to the service will be assessed professionally to ensure that both the victim and perpetrator are suitable to go ahead with the procedure. Some victims and perpetrators find the scheme very rewarding and it can give them closure.

Victims can obtain referral through the Police, Youth Justice Service or by self-referral.

Timebanking is a scheme that allows residents in a community to share their time, skills and talents for time. Whatever the activity, one hour = one hour. For every hour you earn by helping someone in the community you have an hour to spend on something you would like help with or just simply something you like doing. The activity can be anything from gardening, crafts, dog walking, music lessons, computer support, DIY, having a cup of tea with someone etc.

To be part of the scheme you have to become a member, this involves completing a membership form, providing two character references, providing photographic ID and proof of address and finally signing our Time Swap handbook, this induction process is done in person. Once a member you will receive a free hour to start you off. All exchanges must be organised through Jo Perkins, the Erewash Time Swap Project Officer. This ensures that the exchange is covered by our insurance and that we are confident that everyone is happy and safe in the exchange. It maybe that some members are only happy to do exchanges in group settings or that some members need a parent, carer or support worker with them. We are holding regular time swap get togethers to give members a chance to all meet each other and for people to come along and find out more. Our next session will be held at Long Eaton Library on the 8th December 1-2pm. Please come along to find out more.
